Community Outreach, October – Barb McClure

Our Community Service volunteers make quilts for many people who need the comfort a warm quilt can give them. Many nonprofit groups contact us for quilts needed for raffles to raise money to support their funding needs. Since 2008, we have given quilts to the following charities:

Our club roster has grown rapidly these last few years – approximately 75, more or less. We need volunteers to help make quilts for our Community Outreach Program. Only a handful of people are taking club fabric home to make quilt tops, cut borders, backs and binding for quilt tops that are ready to complete. We seem to be losing sight of just how much good we can contribute to helping others in need. Perhaps many club members think that their help isn't needed, but this is not the case. As a result, the few that are helping cannot work full time on community service projects. They have their own sewing projects they want to work on. If each of us took just one project or "kit" to work on each month, just think what we could accomplish! Please support of our club's efforts and share the work load with the other club members.

Some of the "kits" are for children. We have fabric panels and many have blocks ready to sew together. Some just need one border added. Many kits already have the borders and binding cut ready to sew and have fabric included for the back. Generally we cut the fabrics 3-4 inches larger (on the smaller quilts) than the top measures. These quilts are usually in the 40-45 inch finished size. They can be sandwiched together, pinned and then tied on your kitchen table. We supply the batting, needles and thread to tie the quilts, and even will supply the sewing thread if you need it. Binding needs to be applied to finish each quilt and if you know how to sew binding by machine, that would be a big plus. If you can't finish the binding by machine or by hand, turn it back in and someone else will volunteer to complete the quilt.

Those of us members who have been in the club for a while should encourage new members to take a project home. It will be a good learning experience for new members that are just learning to sew blocks and tie quilts. What better way to do this than with the fabric and supplies available to the club members.

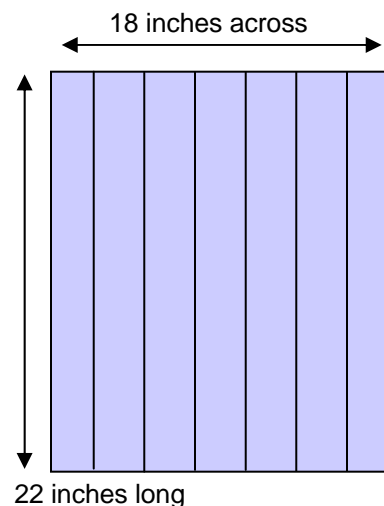
So please call me at 206-244-4333 (home) or 206-491-3069 (cell) to arrange to pick up a "kit" at my home, where fabric and supplies are. This will make it easier for members who work to arrange a time to pick up a project. I'm flexible, so there won't be any specific day of the month as it was in the past to pick up a project.

Don't be shy, please call.

2.5-inch Strips Exchange at Business Meetings – Jill Ellis

Cutting directions: Lay your fat quarter down so the **18-inch sides are across the top and bottom**. Cut seven 2.5-inch strips from that fat quarter, so they will be 2.5 x 22 inches. Cut 10 fat quarters into strips, then put them into 7 piles of 10.

Please use something other than tape to bundle your strips together. I use the largest stitch on my sewing machine to sew 5-6 stitches down the center of each pile. This will keep the strips together and we don't have to mess with bits of tape pulling threads off each strip, or a bunch of tiny baggies. Put your 7 bundles of strips into a large Ziplock or paper bag with your name on it and bring it to each business meeting. There are a lot of patterns calling for strips, and I'd be happy to provide info on some of those. You can also go to www.quiltville.com for good ideas on using 2.5-inch strips.



UFO Challenge Guidelines 2009-2010 – Linda Hill

- ✂ Project must have been started prior to June 2009 and completed by April 22, 2010.
- ✂ Project start date is the date CQ member began work on the project.
- ✂ "Started" means some progress has been made on the UFO. Simply buying fabric and patterns does not qualify as a UFO.
- ✂ Total outside perimeter must be at least 54 inches.
- ✂ "Finished" means that quilting and binding are done. Embellishments are optional.
- ✂ UFO Entry forms should be submitted when project is shown during "Show 'n' Tell at business meetings.
- ✂ Entry forms may also be submitted with a picture of completed project (if project is not available for show 'n' tell)
- ✂ UFO projects other than quilts are eligible for entry if project has at least 6 hours labor involved in completion.
- ✂ Have fun. Get creative

Swine Flu versus Colds: A Comparison of Symptoms – contributed by Pam Elliott

The only way to stop the spread of the epidemic is to spread the awareness.

Symptom	Cold	H1N1 Flu
Fever	Rare	Usually present in up to 80% of all flu cases; a temp of 100 degrees or higher for 3-4 days is associated with the flu.
Coughing	A hacking, productive (mucus-producing) cough is often present	A nonproductive (nonmucus-producing cough is usually present; sometimes referred to as a dry cough
Aches	Slight body aches and pains can be part of a cold	Severe aches and pains are common.
Stuffy nose	Commonly present; typically resolves spontaneously within a week	Not commonly present
Chills	Not common	60% of people who have the flu experience chills
Tiredness	Fairly mild	Moderate to severe
Sneezing	Commonly present	Not common
Sudden symptoms	Cold symptoms tend to develop over a few days	The flu has a rapid onset within 3-6 hours; it hits hard and includes sudden symptoms like high fever, aches, and pains
Headache	Not common	Very common with the flu, present in 80% of flu cases
Sore throat	Commonly present	Not common
Chest discomfort	Mild to moderate	Often severe

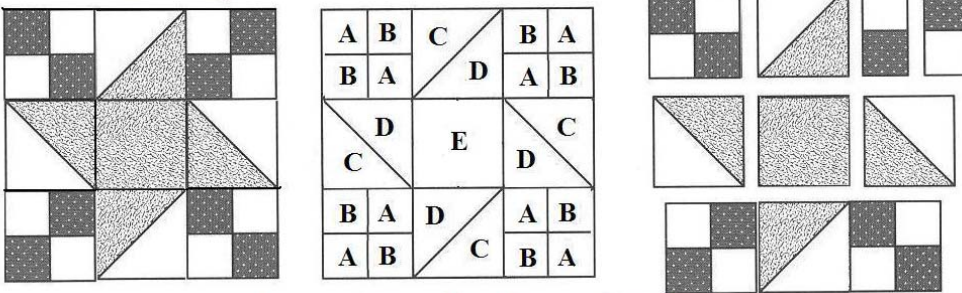
Tips / Hints (Please let me know if you have something great you'd like to share!)

- Before sewing down your label on the back of a quilt, tuck small pieces (3x3 inches or so) of the fabric used in the quilt behind the label. If there is ever a need to repair a rip or small hole, the fabric is right there, and it will have been washed as often as the fabric on the front, so there will be no color difference.
- When making a quilt with blocks on point, use this calculation to figure out the size of the squares to cut into setting triangles: Block size DIVIDED by 1.414, then ADD 0.875. Round up if needed, then cut square diagonally.
- When machine quilting, instead of stitching exactly in the ditch, stitch about 1/4 inch away from your seam lines; that way, if your stitching lines don't match exactly with the seam line, it won't be as noticeable.
- Use light thread unless you are quilting on dark fabric. For some reason, dark thread shows all of your "mistakes" more than light thread
- Use a print fabric to hide your machine quilting stitches. Your stitches will be hidden even more if you use matching thread.
- Spray starch your backing fabric until it is stiff. This will help it glide over the surface of the table, as well as prevent puckers and tucks. It will wash out easily when your quilt is finished, if it doesn't wear out as you quilt it.








My Quilts are in a Gallery!

Community Service Block – Friendship Star Variation – Carol Berge



For 1 Block = 12 1/2" inches unfinished

Dark Blue Print	A: 8  2 1/2" x 2 1/2" squares = 2 1/2" x 20" Strip
Light Blue Print	B: 8  2 1/2" x 2 1/2" squares = 2 1/2" x 20" Strip
	C: 2  →  4 7/8" squares
Yellow Circle Print	D: 2  →  4 7/8" squares
	E: 1  4 1/2" square

- Sew the strips of Fabric A to Fabric B; subcut into 8 units, 2.5 x 4.5 inches
- Sew A&D units into a 4-patch; make 4 (4.5x4.5 inches)
- Construct half-square triangles (HST) with the C&D units; make 4 HST
- Sew units together as shown
- Hint: when making the C&D units for the HSTs, square these up to 4.5 inches.

A great big thank you to everyone who contributes to Community Service. Winter is coming and the need for community service quilts will rise tremendously. Your support makes it possible to help fill this need for our community.

I want to thank Jill Ellis for providing last month's Zigzag block pattern. I hope everyone enjoyed making it as much as I did.

Do you have a simple quilt pattern that would be suitable for a community service block. I would prefer 12-inch blocks or larger to speed putting a top together. Send your suggested patterns to me. Also, if you want to make a "Stash Block" of the month and do not have the fabrics that are listed in your stash, please use whatever fabrics you choose. These blocks can be sashed and put together as a "Sample Block Quilt." We are very resourceful and can use any and all blocks submitted to us.

Pheromones and Fabric Study – contributed by Diane Kellar

A recent study indicated that fabric gives off certain Pheromones that actually hypnotize women and cause them to purchase unreasonable amounts. When stored in large quantities in enclosed spaces, the Pheromones (in the fabric) cause memory loss and induce the nesting syndrome (similar to the one squirrels have before the onset of winter; i.e., storing food), therefore perpetuating their species, and not having a population loss due to their kind being cut into pieces and mixed with others. Sound tests have also revealed that these fabrics emit a very high-pitched sound, heard only by a select few, a breed of women known as "quilters."
