CQ Community Outreach is a huge undertaking for our guild and can't be accomplished by just a few members. We need your help, please! This month's BOM is one of the guild's favorite blocks. This block was created by Lu Olson. Please use yellow and blue prints from your stash. Kits will not be available this month. Each block submitted by you will be eligible for the monthly drawing. We need 72 blocks to make one queen top; hopefully our members will submit enough blocks to make two tops.

Diane Kellar generously provided the instructions for April's BOM, "Highlight," which was a huge hit with the members. She also put together the kits using guild fabrics. Su Jaynes has spent many hours sewing the BOM blocks into tops for the guild. She recently finished the January BOM blocks into a 72x84 top, which was given to Pam Elliot at the April business meeting.



Lu's Scrappy Block, Crazy Quilters favorite BOM! 10x10-inch finished block. Use blue and yellow prints from your stash. Four blocks can be made from just two fat quarters! Using a variety of prints makes a great scrappy quilt—make lots, we need your help! Please square up your blocks to 10.5 inches. A scant ¼-inch seam is suggested to obtain the best results for a 10.5-inch block.

Cut the following for each block, using 2.5-inch strips

Blue prints
Cut 2 pieces 2.5 x 4.5
Cut 3 pieces 2.5 x 6.5

Yellow prints
Cut 2 pieces 2.5 x 2.5
Cut 2 pieces 2.5 x 4.5
Cut 2 pieces 2.5 x 6.5



To assemble each block: Row 1 Sew black 2.5 x 4.5-inch piece to white 2.5 x 6.5-inch piece Row 2 Sew black 2.5 x 6.5-inch piece to white 2.5 x 4.5-inch piece Row 3 Sew white 2.5 x 2.5-inch piece to each end of a black 2.5 x 6.5-inch piece Sew white 2.5 x 4.5-inch piece Row 4 to black 2.5 x 6.5-inch piece Sew white 2.5 x 6.5 inch piece Row 5 to black 2.5 x 4.5-inch piece

Charity Quilt May Be World's Longest Quilt

Quilt makers in Elderslie, a suburb of Sydney, Australia, are working for a good cause and seeking a world record. Jenny Thurling of Narellan Vale, Australia, coordinated volunteers to make a 600-foot quilt that will be cut into smaller quilts and auctioned to raise money for a Down Syndrome center in MacArthur, New South Wales, Australia. A crowd gathered earlier this month to hold the quilt as it was measured. Paperwork is en route to Guinness in hopes of claiming the record for the longest quilt in the world.

It was all hands on deck recently when locals took part in some heavy lifting to help measure what could be the world's longest quilt. They lined Curry Reserve in Elderslie at the World Down Syndrome Day celebrations to help Macarthur MP Russell Matheson measure the quilt.

The quilt was made by Narellan Vale resident Jenny Thurling and a group of local volunteers who will now fill out the official paperwork to apply for the Guinness World Record. Mrs. Thurling said the quilt length was 600 feet (or 182 metres).

"We now have to send all the information in and then we'll go from there," she said. "Then we will separate the quilt into smaller quilts and are hoping to auction some of them on May 7 for The Right Start."

Money raised by the sale of the quilts will be put towards Australia's first Downs Syndrome-specific center in Macarthur.


For each fat quarter you bring for the drawing, your name will be put in a bag. The name drawn will win all of the fat quarters.

On May 12, we had a Mother's Day potluck. Our members are great cooks and always bring "yummy" food for all to enjoy. Most of us cook only when we have to – we'd rather be making quilts. During the meeting/potluck, quilt kits were handed out to everyone to put together and return them to be worked on and completed in group workshops to be scheduled in the near future. Please let Pam Elliott, Linda Hill, Diane Kellar and Kathy Wyckoff know how much you appreciate the amount of time they spent pulling fabric from the club's "stash." After fabric was sorted, they bundled them up into "quilt-top kits" and place each kit into plastic bags and distributed them at the Mother's Day Potluck to everyone. They still have about 4 more kits to give out. It is very important to put these quilt-top kits together and return them by the next meeting, May 26. Otherwise, we will not have any tops to tie at the workshops in the next few weeks. We need 12-14 large tops just to go The Puyallup Fair. This is where our club volunteers will demonstrate over a period of several weekends how to tie a quilt for everyone who visits the Home Arts Department on the second floor during The Fair.

I've heard there are plans to organize our club fabric and batting. Oh, I hope so! In December 2006, I volunteered my two large upstairs rooms to house all of the club's donated fabric, to be organized on racks by color, season, novelties, plaids, fat quarters, and large pieces for backs and borders. Also, there are shelves holding fabric that has already been made into binding strips, and fabric "leftovers" to be used for binding, patchwork or strip piecing. All of this is available for use, but it has reached a point where we need to be more organized. The club needs to have more than just one person to "sort-of" know where to find "stuff"!

Please organize between yourselves when you would be able to come. Just give me a call; I'm here most every day during the week and most Sunday afternoons. Bring your Starbuck's, sack lunch or snack. My kitchen is available to warm up your food. See you soon!

A gift of warmth for woman vets – found at www.timesunion.com (Albany, New York) – by Dania Bianchi Published 12:01 a.m., Thursday, April 14, 2011

A local quilt shop owner saw an article about plans for a shelter for homeless female veterans and knew she wanted to help out. Vicki Feldman said she and shop co-owner Barbara Haynes figured they had the means right at their fingertips. "We decided we wanted to provide the women with quilts," Feldman said.

The two own Almost One of a Kind Quilt Shop in Ballston Spa. When word of the project got around, Feldman and Haynes found plenty of people willing to lend a hand.

"The response from the community has been unbelievable," said Haynes, who added she has lost count of the friends, store customers, and others who have helped with the effort. The shop is offering a discount on quilt materials for those taking part.

The shelter will house 11 beds, with the average stay expected to be 6-12 months. During their stay, residents will receive support to find employment, manager their physical and mental health conditions, reconnect with family, and later move into their own residence.

The quilts will be given when women move in to the shelter, and they will be able to take them when they Feldman and Haynes hope the quilts will make the veterans feel more at home. "Not one person that comes into our shop is not touched by the service of our veterans," says Feldman. The owners say many of their customers are women who want to help other women. "The military is finally realizing that women need support, too, and we want to help them," says Feldman.

Haynes and Feldman are continuing to accept donations for the quilts in what they call an ongoing project. They plan to supply each woman arriving at the house with a quilt.
